Frances Daniels, died in Lunenburg on January 29, 2009. She was an Honourary Member of the MBQG. Frances was one of the very early members of the Mahone Bay Quilters'

Guild. She was a very crafty lady! Loved to knit and quilt and was to be found at every craft fair in the area with her table laden with her work. She would go home with orders for many dozens of pairs of her famous socks and I never visited her that she wasn't in her rocking chair surrounded with yarn and partially completed socks.

She was 89 and never gave up her garden even in 2008 when she was obviously having some problems. She gave away so much of her produce - her memorial service at Central United Church in Lunenburg was full of stories about her generosity with vegetables and pickles, etc. and her love of crafts. She was much loved by her friends in the United Church Women where she had worked tirelessly for more than 35 years, locally, provincially and at the Maritime Conference level. I can personally attest to how hard she worked - she was one of several energetic ladies more advanced in years who have been an inspiration to those of us following along.

Our minister chose a Bible reading from Proverbs, ch.31, v. 10-31 at Frances' funeral, and it could have been written about Frances. Look it up sometime.

Frances introduced me to quilting and I am forever grateful to her for that, as well as her friendship. I was her chauffeur to quilting events as well as a member of her UCW unit and I will miss her very much, as I am sure will long-time members of the Guild who knew her for many years.

Art Hits the Wall 2011

On behalf of the Rug Hooking Guild of Nova Scotia, I am pleased to announce that once again "our rugs come off the floors, our quilts come off the beds to become items of unique artistic expression displayed on the wall" at the exhibit, Art Hits the Wall – 2010. Although we do not have all the details finalized for this great event, here is what we do know:

This exhibit is open to all rug hookers and quilters in Atlantic Canada (Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland). The art work must be completed after March 1, 2010 and be created specifically for this event. There will be a \$15 registration fee and will be held somewhere in Nova Scotia from mid-late summer to early fall 2010 (exact dates not yet confirmed).

The theme for this event is ***Tides of Time***. Reflect on a special moment in your life and capture that moment in art form in a rug or quilt. It could be a special moment, experience or event that truly leaves you smiling when you think about that "time". Tell us about this particular moment in a story (up to 200 words) when submitting your art work. Each piece of art submitted must measure 120" maximum perimeter – including frame. The Committee will request permission from each entrant to photograph the art work and obtain a copy of the stories submitted to create a book of this special event. Now doesn't that sound exciting!

BOOKS

“The Girl Who Stopped Swimming” by Joselyn Jackson and recommended by Sandy Ternoway, if you like a good mystery. It is about an art quilter and the author was highly influenced by the art quilter Pamela Allen. Here is a review posted on www.amazon.ca from Publishers Weekly - Jackson matches effortless Southern storytelling with a keen eye for character and heart-stopping circumstances. Laurel, a high-end quilt maker, sees the ghost of a little girl in her bedroom one night. When it leads her to the backyard and a dead girl in the swimming pool, the life Laurel had hoped to build in her gated Florida neighborhood with her video-game designer husband, David, and their tween daughter, Shelby, starts to fall apart. What makes this novel shine are its revelations about the dark side of Southern society and Thalia and Laurel’s finely honed relationship, which shows just how much thicker blood is than water.
